WINTER FUNDRAISER TO BE HELD IN FEBRUARY AT THE FREDERICK HARRIS HOUSE

The Springfield Preservation Trust's 2024 Winter Fundraiser, with the theme "For the Love of the City—A Valentine Soirée," will be held at the Frederick Harris House, at 270 Maple Street, on February 4, 2024, at 1:00pm. The home—historically known as the Frederick Harris House, and now as Valentine Mansion—was built in 1886 and is owned by Katherine Prewitt, who runs the home as an events space and owner-occupied bed and breakfast.

HISTORY OF THE HOME AND ITS ORIGINAL OWNERS

Frederick Harris and Emily Osborne were married in 1879, and shortly afterward they moved into this new house near the crest of the hill on Maple Street. Frederick was the son of Frederick H. Harris, a banker who came to Springfield in 1838 at the age of 15 and found work as a bank clerk. After a few years, the elder Frederick began working in the lumber industry, but later returned to

banking as the cashier of Pynchon Bank. In 1864, he joined Springfield's Third National Bank as cashier, and became the company president in 1886.

Emily, however, came from an even more prominent family. Originally from Auburn, New York, her father David was a prominent businessman and mayor, but her family was even better know for social activism. Her grandmother, Martha Coffin Wright, and her great aunt, Lucretia Coffin Mott, were both leaders of the abolitionist and women's rights movements, and her brother,

Thomas Mott Osborne, was the warden of Sing Sing and an influential prison reform advocate. Her sister, Helen Osborne Storrow, was a wealthy philanthropist, and Helen's husband was James Jackson Storrow II, a Boston businessman who briefly served as president of General Motors in the company's early years.

The younger Frederick Harris followed his father's footsteps as a banker, starting out as a messenger for Third National in 1871. He steadily advanced in the bank, though, and eventually became vice president and then president, succeeding his father after his death in 1911. In addition, he was also active politically, and served as an alderman and as a member of the school committee. When the house was completed, it was considerably smaller than its current appearance. The first major expansion came in 1886, followed by the addition of a ballroom in 1900, bringing the house to over 10,000 square feet of living space.

Frederick and Emily had two children, Florence and Helen, but they were hardly the only residents of this house. Like other wealthy families of the era, they regularly employed multiple servants who lived here. In the 1900 census, they had three, and by 1910 they had four: a housekeeper, waitress, cook, and laundress. Florence moved out after her marriage in 1907 to Frederic Jones, and the couple later moved into a nearby house on Maple Street. Like his father-in-law, Frederic Jones would later go on to serve as president of Third National Bank.

The Trust looks forward to hosting its annual winter fundraiser at this and is grateful for Katherine Prewitt for opening it up to us in support of our mission to protect, preserve, and promote historic properties of Springfield. HILTON ABBOTT LEAVES A LEGACY OF CIVIC ENGAGEMENT & HISTORIC PRESERVATION

The Springfield Preservation Trust sends its condolences to family and friends of Hilton Abbott (1940-2023), who made a formidable impact on historic preservation in Springfield, through his volunteerism and personal stewardship of multiple historic homes, including 64 Washington Road and 87 Maplewood Terrace, both in Forest Park, both welcome gathering spots for the community. At 64 Washington Road, the Abbotts were frequent hosts of the Washington Road Progressive Dinner, a three-course meal hosted by three homes annually each December. At 87 Maplewood Terrace, the Abbotts welcomed the Trust on multiple occasions for the annual Historic Homes Tour. Hilton and his wife, Linda Yager Abbott, embodied the spirit of civic engagement and community building. They have passed on their love of historic homes to their three children—Mary-Alice Abbott, Mark Abbott, and Joya Abbott—all of whom reside in historic homes, built in 1898, 1906, and 1930.

Beyond his own historic homes, Hilton took an interest in greater preservation in his neighborhood and the city. He was active in the revitalization of the Springfield Preservation Trust in the mid-1970s, served on the Trust board for several years, and was an active member while residing in Springfield. Along with a small group of dedicated activists, Hilton was involved in the creation of the Forest Park Heights Local Historic District in 1975, and was an engaged member of the Forest Park Civic Association, as well, serving as editor of the group's "Picturesque Forest Park Heights" book, which many consider to be the foremost historical overview of the neighborhood. Hilton, too, was an early organizer of the effort to save the Indian Motocycle building—now the Mason Square Apartments—when it was destined for demolition in the 1970s.

Hilton will be missed, but his legacy lives on through the everlasting impact he impressed upon this city. May he rest in peace, and may all who loved him find solace in the legacy he leaves behind.

7-9 STOCKBRIDGE STREET REHABILITATION UPDATE

Rehabilitation of our vacant, deteriorated building at 7-9 Stockbridge Street is slowly progressing. We were fortunate to receive a \$100,000 grant from the Springfield Historic Preservation Trust Fund, the casino mitigation fund, and \$150,920 from the Community Preservation Act program. These rehabilitation funds are in addition to the \$200,000 zero-interest, zero-payment forgivable loan from Bob McCarroll, which enabled us to purchase the building in April 2023.

Architect Steve Jablonski is coordinating environmental and structure analysis and drawing up interior layouts. An environmental firm has conducted an assessment, which found some hazardous material. Removal specifications are being written, and we will be looking for a company to do removal. A structural engineer is determining whether building settlement occurred in the past or is continuing. Crack monitors were installed in early December, and results are due in three months. Unless serious problems are detected, we will then proceed with repairs to the brick façade, roof replacement, installation of historically appropriate windows, and exterior painting.

We are exploring additional funding possibilities to help with the build-out of SPT's office and the upper two floor apartments.
