In 2023, the Springfield Preservation Trust (SPT) took a bold step forward in preserving our city's rich history by acquiring 7-9 Stockbridge Street, the third-oldest building in downtown Springfield. As we began its rehabilitation, we quickly discovered structural concerns. Instead of seeing a roadblock, we saw an opportunity—to strengthen not only this historic landmark but also our commitment to preservation.

Rather than being discouraged, we leaned into our mission, partnering with expert consultants to diagnose the issues and craft a thoughtful plan for restoration. For over 50 years, SPT has been the only nonprofit, nongovernmental advocacy group dedicated to historic preservation in Springfield. # STOCKBRIDGE REHABILITATION

Structural issues at 7-9 Stockbridge Street extended the rehabilitation timeline.



### Stabilizing Stockbridge Street

Our most ambitious current project is the rehabilitation of 7-9 Stockbridge Street, the third oldest building in downtown Springfield. Built in 1845 and known as the Guenther and Handel's Block, it was built as one of a series constructed on Stockbridge in the 1840s. We are rehabilitating it into a three-unit building, with our office and historic preservation education center on the first floor, and two residential units on the upper floors. Once complete, rental income will offset building operation costs.

After acquisition and a strong start to fundraising in 2023, we ran into unexpected structural issues as we kicked off the project. We were able to adjust our \$100,000 Springfield Historic Preservation Trust Fund grant to include structural studies and rehabilitation. Working with architect Steve Jablonski and environmental engineering firm O'Reilly, Talbot & Okun Engineering, crack monitor and soil boring tests were conducted, with the ultimate prognosis that foundational movement is likely to continue. A stabilization plan has been drawn up and we are pursuing CPA funding in 2025. Having identified a solution, the original exterior work will move forward. Roof replacement and masonry repair will commence in Spring 2025.

# EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

Record-high attendance continued with our educational programming, including virtual lectures, Second Saturday Walking Tours, and the annual "Voices from the Grave" tour.

We kicked off the year with our monthly virtual lecture series, to engage the community during the colder months. Sessions included:

# ADVOCACY MILESTONES

Each year, Springfield Preservation Trust identifies its "Most Endangered Historic Resources List," along with a "Watch List."

We monitor properties for deed changes and on-site activity, and also communicate with owners or potential buyers/developers when possible. While keeping tabs on properties, we also actively advocate at City Hall and the Springfield Historical Commission (SHC) for preservation measures.
